Ode To Pertle Springs
Time to do some singing ya"ll!

Hark! The song of Pertle, beautiful Pertle Springs
Where the laughing water, ever seaward sings
Where the wandering night winds, Thru the woods complain
Where the birds of morning, wake their choral strain.

Chorus: Pertle! Pertle! Down in a shady glen Thine unfailing fullness, o'er and o'er again Dip we, drink we, gift of the King of Kings Type of life eternal, Beautiful Pertle Springs

By the springs of Pertle, sparking, clear and cold High upon the hill crest, stand a hostel old 'Fore whose ample portals lies a lovely scene Hill and vale and lake let glimpsed thru living green.

Pertle Springs

Pertle Springs was a popular recreation and leisure destination of the late 19th and early 20th century. It operated as a mineral spring resort from the 1880s to the 1920s. During its prime, Pertle Springs boasted a huge open air auditorium, numerous cottages, meeting halls, an elaborate gazebo, a green house, a zoo, a bowling alley, and an 150 room hotel. (The Minnewawa Hotel).

Pertle Springs was purchased by James H. Christopher in 1884 and he started development of the land in 1885. James was a marketing genius and promoted Pertle Springs as a "self-improvement opportunity not just reckless enjoyment." He added four manufactured lakes and introduced new plants, animals, birds, and fish into the area.

Attendance skyrocketed with the addition of the Missouri Pacific Railroad and with the implementation of "The Dummy Line".

The Dummy Line was finished in 1889 and was a single track street car route with a few open passenger cars and a tiny steam engine called a dummy. The route ran between the railroad station and Pertle Springs. During Pertle Springs' haydays, it wasn't unusual for the dummy line to make twenty trips back and forth.

Minnewawa Hotel

Built in 1884, The Minnewawa Hotel was three stories tall and could accommodate 300 guests. There are no known pictures of the interior but descriptions from guests stated that the hotel was spacious and lavishly furnished. A herd of 40 cows provided guests with fresh milk and butter. Vegetables and fruits were also grown at the resort to provide patrons with fresh produce.

In 1898 The Minnewawa Hotel was one of the first buildings in Warrensburg to have electricity AND running water.

Minnewawa is a Native American (possibly Osage?) word that loosely translates to "healing water".
